#### State Inspector Demonstration

- Mites
  - o Emphasize treating for mites in order to keep bees without them dying over winter
  - Recommend to treat with Apavar in Spring or the day you get bees
  - June peek for Bee brood but Aug 20 peek season for mites so June / July treat with Formic Acid (will penetrate cappings)
  - Apaguard after you take honey off Aug / Sept
  - Early Spring / Late Fall Oxalic Acid when there is no brood (kills mites running around)
  - Approx: \$7 a treatment at 4 treatments a year per hive (\$28 vs \$140 package of bees)

- Bee Diseases
  - American Foulbrood
    - Bacteria
    - Will spread so must kill bees and burn hive
    - Musty smell and gooey cells
    - Spores will last 4-5 years
    - Can send 2" comb sample to USDA wrapped in newspaper to check for foulbrood
    - Antibiotic treatment 6 weeks before honey supers are put on
  - European Foulbrood
    - Bacteria
    - Brought on by stress from the nurse bees
    - Treat bees and bees will clean up hive
  - Chalkbrood
    - Fungus
    - Scrape frames away from hive to prevent spore reinfestation
    - Burn scrapings
    - Requeen
  - Nosema
    - Scrape old frames away from hive
    - Feed fumagillin
  - Hive Beetle
    - Light encourages egg laying
    - Lay in cracks
    - Beetle traps or cloth for prevention
    - Extract within 3 days of removing honey frames, if beetles run across frames they can ruin the honey crop with their urine
  - Wax Moth
    - Scrape off frames
  - Animal pests skunks, raccoon, bear
